INHSU CONFERENCE

PATH-EX

The PATH-EX program – Peer Assisted Treatment for Hepatitis – is returning to fieldwork and will be rolling out rapid point-of-care oral antibody tests for participants. The Peer Specialists recently received training from Burnet Institute on how to use Orasure's testing kits.



BBV Training

HRVic's BBV program resumed in-person training for both the community and workforce for the first time since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Workforce training started at WIRE – Women's Information and Referral Exchange – and community education is planned for the Launch Southbank housing service.

We are also planning for World Hepatitis Day later in the month, with special events to be attended by the PATH team and the Health Promotion Team working on an HRVic position paper on hepatitis C elimination.

ST VINCENT'S PRISON PROGRAM

As of the 1st of July the statewide hepatitis program in Victorian prisons has been operational for 6 years. We've now treated over 3000 people in custody for hepatitis C. Like most health programs, the COVID 19 pandemic has necessitated adaption of normal service delivery.

The team have continued to work closely with all primary health care teams in prisons to ensure viral hepatitis services are ongoing. The CovidSafe plan is adhered to and SHP staff continue to monitor closely advice from DJCS, DHS and St Vincent's Hospital.

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

Global progress report

On May 20 2021, The World Health Organization released its latest global progress report on HIV, viral hepatitis and sexually transmitted infections, 2021. The report highlights achievements and gaps in the global hepatitis C response and steps needed to reach elimination by 2030.

The Federal Department of Health recently released The First National **Blood Borne Viruses and Sexually Transmissible Infections Research** Strategy 2021-2025.

The Strategy aims to support nationally relevant research and innovation, and capacity building in reducing the incidence and impact of BBVs and STIs in Australia, in line with the goals and targets of the five National BBV and STI Strategies.

NEW RESEARCH PROJECT RECRUITING PARTICIPANTS

The Commonwealth Department of Health has funded researchers at La Trobe University to conduct a study on telehealth for hepatitis C treatment during COVID-19.

The research aims to explore people's experiences of telehealth during the COVID-19 pandemic, to document the support needs of people living with hepatitis C and those providing care and treatment, and to develop recommendations for ongoing access to telehealth where it is useful.

We want to interview people who have used phone and/or video conferencing for hepatitis C treatment or follow up care. Consumer participants are reimbursed \$50 for their time. Please pass this information on to anyone who may be eligible to participate.

Participation involves a confidential audio-recorded 45 minute interview.
